Christianity Today published an interesting article this past month.

The article I'm thinking of, written by Karl Vaters, is titled, "How Did Those 10-Year Vision Statements Turn Out For Everyone?" Vaters recalls the churches who produced vision statements in 2010 for the 2020 year. He continues to write about why he did not write one.

He says, "If I had decided to write a 2020 Vision statement, I have a pretty good idea where I'd be right now. In the same place I was in 2010. Wondering what had gone wrong with all my well-laid plans." Vaters encourages the reader to "let go" and "let God." Instead of setting sights on the future, he says we should take everything one day at a time. Rather than pushing for goals, he says we should take joy in the "now."

While Vaters raises good concerns, I would say that the reason his vision statement for his church wouldn't work is not because of a lack of trust in God, or because vision statements are ineffective. It's because the vision statement is his. Throughout the article, Vaters repeatedly uses the language of "I" when referring to the vision statement. While I'm guessing he is a faithful leader in many ways, when you're working with a community of faith, and when that community of faith is discerning how to be faithful to God, then we don't want to ask the question, "what's my vision statement?" We want to ask the question. "what is God's vision for this church?"

Pastor Alicia and I could come up with our own vision statement, and then try to convince the rest of the church (and God!) that we have the right answer. But we believe that's the wrong way to go about this. We believe the process of arriving at a vision statement needs to include the voices of the congregation. But it also doesn't stop by listening to the voices just within Holy Trinity's walls. In January and February, the third phase of the 2020 Vision process will involve "Looking Outward." If we have the courage and humility to listen to what the world needs from the church, we might have a better understanding of what God's purpose is for us as well.

Outward Huddle: On January 5th, from 4-6pm, we are kicking off this phase with an "Outward Huddle." We are bringing in external voices to share their perspectives. Bishop Ann Svennungsen will speak about what she sees in our synod and the greater ELCA, and how Holy Trinity might respond. We'll have the Fleshpots of Egypt play, a band comprised of 3 Lutheran pastors and a Luther Seminary professor. We'll even have a friend of mine who doesn't go to church anymore. And Lakeside Supper Club is catering. You won't want to miss this!

Road Trips: Through January and February, we'll also be taking a series of "Road Trips." Dennis Jasperson of the Vision Team is coordinating these trips to other local churches, other ELCA churches, as well as destination churches. While we will still have worship at Holy Trinity every week, you are invited to join a road trip to worship elsewhere, where we will take a look at best practices of other churches, but also reflect on what we notice about HTLC when we are on the outside, looking in.

Mission Moments: What does New Prague need from Holy Trinity? During January and February, George Winn from the Vision Team is bringing in a series of community leaders to share "Mission Moments" on what our community needs from Holy Trinity. Our mayor is coming. Representatives from senior care, education, Peace Center, Beacon Interfaith Housing Network, etc are coming. What are the needs people see? How can the people of God at Holy Trinity respond?

At the end, this Vision isn't mine. It's not Pastor Alicia's. If we take the time to listen to the voices not only from the inside of the church, but also from the outside, we just might have a clearer sense of what God is calling us to do and to be "now" in 2020 and for years to come. Here we go!
